

End of OUR Gopher Daily Bulletin

The Minneapolis Grand Slam Club has stepped up to sponsor the daily bulletin for the last three years. In the post-Covid environment, allocating funds for more personal reportage risked tournament profitability. Most of what you see happens in the weeks before the tournament begins. Formatting is time intensive. I believe the time invested IS worthwhile because both advancing and experienced players benefit from the many extras a human-created document provides.

I've edited the Gopher Daily Bulletin for 17 years. As well, for close to the same length of time I have written a weekly bulletin for the Grand Slam Club analyzing auctions, nice plays, and links to relevant treatments. This year the Gopher Daily News highlighted swing hands from the D14 GNT Championship Flight Finals and deals from the excellent book: **Dormer on Deduction Inferential Reasoning in the Play of the Cards at Bridge'.** Other added benefits: Lunch & Learn handouts, a page of links to other bridge sources, interesting deals from our regional and links to upcoming tournaments.

Attaining lifemasterhood without a concomitant interest in mastering the subtler aspects of the game has been a recipe for Gold Rush graduates to disappear from competitive play for some number of years. It's also much nicer to see pics of winning pairs rather than head shots of players who have uploaded them to the CommonGame.

The FastResults team, affiliated with the Common Game, has become the easy route to produce daily bulletins at an extremely favorable price point. The big advantage to using Fast Results: no need to format results. The FastResultsDailvBulletin, without stories, is useful, but lacks color.

Economics may no longer support our/my homegrown compositions, but can we afford not to offer players a value added product. What can we do about it? Taking advantage of the many resources available to enrich the players' experience is the best way to incentivize the 'interested' but less experienced player to become more accomplished and committed tournament attendees.

A suggestion to stratiflight the top bracket would give the lower ranked squads in the top bracket a bite of overalls in a second tier. This makes sense to me. No one enjoys being the 'prey' to much more accomplished and experienced teams. Increase the top bracket size and pay out A/X masterpoints.

An auction is a conversation where each side assesses their potential to take tricks while simultaneously trying to determine the number of tricks their opponents are claiming to take. The two auctions above lend themselves to a closer analysis:

South has the perfect shape for a Michaels cuebid promising 5-5 or better major suit length. Is there an argument in favor of doubling? Maybe, if South is even stronger and has a self sufficient suit.

Double hides your shape. XX 1 3 4 4. West doesn't have either the shape or strength for a redouble. You won't have enough major suit length to double a NS major suit contract. Support with support. I'm a fan of "flip-flop" over the double. Flip/flop employs 2N for the preemptive raise and 3D for the limit raise. Why? The most likely game contract when responder has no major is 3N and you want the lead coming into partner's tenaces. Ed Manfield wrote an article: *I've Got a Secret* that won an award from the IBPA in 1982. You can find a summary online as the original is now behind a paywall.

West has ompletely shown their values with 5D. To bid again with a square hand is not winning bridge.


Keith and Brad took full advantage of inexperienced opponents. 2S must have been alerted as showing a limit raise or better in diamonds. Invisible cuebids are part of a valuable defense vs two-suited overcalls known as <u>Unusual vs Unusual.</u> Presumably,

2H by West would have shown something in the 4th suit (clubs). North **must absolutely double 2S** to let South know there is a spade fit. When South competed with 3H the spade suit was lost.

Kurt Schaeffer shared the following deal from the Friday Bracketed Swiss: New Partnership

- 1. Don't invent bids that can confuse
- 2. Have solid values
- 3. Strive for plus scores
- 4. Take pressure off as partner might be nervous


Violating at least 3 of the above rules, you pick up this hand in the first match if the day, first board of the match



First deal of the Friday Bracketed Swiss New Partnership <u>Stolen bid</u> was undiscussed (double to show hearts); system is on, so 2 hearts might be construed as transfer to spades; 2NT is possible (playing lebensohl) as a follow up 3 hearts would be showing what? Natural? Cue bid? Avoiding confusion & using the famous Hamman logic, I bid the practical 3NT! Everyone passed!

Partner, Joe Koester, won the diamond Q at trick one, divined the 4-1 heart break at tricks two and three (cashed the K, dropping the singleton Q on the right and ducked the second round when LHO split from JTxx) After a spade switch by the opps, ducked to the Q, Joe hooked the heart nine and soon claimed +400 for a 7 IMP gain Well done Joe K. and the KurtJoe new partnership anchored the team the rest of the day to a nice win in Bracket 1 Swiss on Friday.

Lunch With Our Region 5Director



Currently, there are 25 geographically defined districts as shown on the map on the left. The 25 districts have been combined into 13 regions (district boundaries remain unchanged). By 2024, the 13 regions will have one representative on the ACBL Board of Directors, and the districts will no longer be individually represented.

[Ed. Each unit used to receive a share of the annual membership fee based on unit population with no restrictions (11%). Starting this year, units will have ability to earn up to 15% by reaching performance objectives in new member recruitment and member retention. Failure to make an effort earns you just 5% instead of 11%]

Each unit will receive a share of ACBL membership fees via the <u>5/5/5 Program</u>. We encourage units to use these fees for programs to increase membership and enhance the enjoyment of the game for all members.5/5/5 Success Scale.

D13 & D14 have lost their own director seat on the BOD. D12, D13, & D14 are now Region 5. The former D12 BOD rep, <u>Dennis Carmen</u>, now represents Region 5. Dennis, an Emerald LM, has represented D12 on the ACBL BOD since 1986! He and his wife, Susan, came to the Gopher this year and I had the opportunity to share time between sessions on Friday. I'd previously emailed him asking about recent Grass Roots Fund history (see next page).

His first comment was the importance of getting with the 5-5-5 program that incentivizes units.

I wanted to discuss why, if the league could employ a complicated formula to distribute Grass Roots Fund dollars to districts doing the best in reaching the 'grass roots', they couldn't they retain a 'tithe' from online play entry fees that would allow players to play anytime, anywhere, with a portion of their entry fee returned back to the player's home unit. The gravitation of VACB play to the large consortia strangles small clubs.

I also discussed the need/value for an online portal where players could find partners, clubs could advertise their VACB game characteristics, members could give testimonials about bridge, and best practices could be promulgated. We are losing the most experienced, knowledgeable volunteers to age, and aren't banking their wisdom.

The ACBL should be utilizing the GNTs and NAPs as onramps to NABCs for less experienced players. Compensating pro teams in the championship flight of the GNTs? Why? These players are coming to the NABCs with or without district support. I resigned after a decade as GNT coordinator when the BOD legislated against my GNT conditions of contest for D4. We would give a Flight B GNT squad, all of whom with less than 1,000MPs competing against squads with over 2,000MPs a trip to the summer NABC if they reached the second day KO semifinal? Of course, this was preCovid when double digit B teams competed in a Swiss on the first day.

Dennis said that the ACBL was contemplating taking over the VACB sanction. I've no idea what that would look like.

I asked if the league is exploring the potential for hybrid play where online and face/face play could be integrated by employing low cost tablets with limited functionality that all players would use..
